"Saya membayar RM4,000 kepada bapa saudara untuk membuat permit, mustahil ia palsu," kata seorang wanita warga Indonesia dikenali sebagai Dewi, 30-an, semalam.

Wanita itu seorang daripada 16 pendatang asing tanpa izin (PATI) yang ditahan Jabatan Imigresen Johor dalam serbuan di Taman Bukit Indah 2 di sini, jam 11 malam semalam.

Menurutnya, dia yakin permit kerjanya itu tulen kerana diuruskan bapa saudaranya.

"Mustahil bapa saudara menipu saya. Saya habiskan banyak belanja membuat permit kerja ini," katanya yang menangis teresak-esak kerana sedih diperdaya.

Sementara itu, Timbalan Penolong Pengarah Bahagian Penguat Kuasa Jabatan Imigresen Johor Sapian Kamaruddin berkata, pemeriksaan terhadap permit kerja wanita berkenaan mendapati ia palsu.

"Bukan setakat cop pada permit kerja, malah cop di pintu masuk ke negara ini juga palsu.

"Wanita terbabit mendakwa tidak pernah berurusan menguruskan permit kerja berkenaan, sebaliknya di-

'Mustahil palsu'

Wanita Indonesia tak percaya ditipu bapa saudara

uruskan bapa saudaranya," katanya di lokasi kejadian. Wanita terbabit dirahan bagi membantu siasatan. Menurutnya, pada operasi itu, 19 pekerja warga Indonesia diperiksa dengan tiga

gunakan rumah kedai dua tingkat itu dengan bilik wanita hanya dipisahkan dengan kanvas.

"Semua mereka bekerja di sebuah tapak pembinaan. Kes disiasat mengikut Seksyen 6 (1) (c) Akta Imigresen 1959/63 kerana tiada dokumen sah dan Seksyen 15 (1) (c) kerana tinggal melebihi masa," katanya.

Majikan, PATI lebih berjaga-jaga elak dicekup

Putrajaya: Tiada banyak perubahan ketara bagi jumlah pendatang tanpa izin (PATI) yang dirahan penguat kuasa pada hari kedua Ops Bersepadu 6P di seluruh negara kelmarin.

Difahamkan, kekurangan tangkapan itu dipercayai berlaku disebabkan tindakan lebih berhati-hati majikan atau PATI termasuk bersembunyi bagi mengelak diperiksa penguat kuasa.

Hari kedua operasi, pihak penguat kuasa hanya memeriksa 65 pekerja asing selain memeriksa 16 PATI menerusi serbuan di enam lokasi berasingan di seluruh negara selain seorang majikan ditahan di Negeri Sembilan bagi membantu siasatan.

Pegawai Perhubungan Awam Jabatan Imigresen Malaysia (JIM) Abdul Haidir Mohd Sukor berkata, secara keseluruhannya, jumlah tangkapan selama dua hari operasi ialah seramai 1,773.

Beliau berkata, jumlah tangkapan itu berkurangan disebabkan tiada banyak operasi digerakkan penguat kuasa memandangkan pegawai dan anggota yang terbabit operasi sebelum ini sedang menyelesaikan urusan dokumentasi PATI

yang dirahan dalam operasi hari pertama.

"Bagaimanapun, ia tidak bermakna kami memperlahankan operasi sebaliknya sedang bersedia untuk operasi seterusnya termasuk menerubus lokasi baru menempatkan PATI di seluruh negara.

"Risikikan mendapati majikan yang menggaji PATI sudah mengambil langkah berhati-hati sejak operasi bermula Selasa lalu," katanya dalam kenyataan dikeluarkan di sini, semalam.

Guna dokumen sah jika bekerja di Malaysia

KUALA LUMPUR 23 Jan. - Duta Besar Indonesia ke Malaysia, Herman Prayitno (**gambar**) mengingatkan rakyat negaranya agar tidak mencari kerja di negara ini tanpa menggunakan dokumen yang sah.

Agensi berita Antara yang memetik kenyataan Herman berkata, pekerja warga Indonesia di Malaysia perlu menyediakan dokumen yang lengkap termasuk pasport, kontrak pekerjaan, visa

pekerjaan dan beberapa dokumen lain.

"Rakyat Indonesia yang mahu bekerja di Malaysia perlu mematuhi undang-undang dan prosedur yang ditetapkan oleh kerajaan negara ini," katanya di sini, hari ini.

Amaran tersebut dikeluarkan selepas pihak berkuasa Malaysia



melancarkan operasi besar-besaran memburu pekerja asing tanpa izin (PATI) di seluruh negara.

Sejak dilancarkan kelmarin, kira-kira 1,900 PATI termasuk 695 rakyat Indonesia ditahan oleh pihak berkuasa selepas kerajaan negara ini menutup pendaftaran pekerja asing.

Menurut Herman, rakyat Indonesia juga perlu berhati-hati agar tidak tertipu dengan sindiket pekerjaan haram yang menjanjikan pekerjaan di Malaysia.

Jelasnya, pihak kedutaan akan terus memantau keadaan PATI Indonesia yang ditahan oleh pihak berkuasa negara ini.

"Sebarang penghantaran pulang rakyat Indonesia yang ditahan, akan dilaksanakan secara

baik dan selamat," katanya.

Sementara itu, pegawai Kedutaan Besar Indonesia di Malaysia, Dino Nurwahyudin berkata, pihaknya bersedia menerima permohonan pasport secara beramai-ramai bagi rakyat Indonesia yang mahu pulang ke tanah air.

"Kami sedia menerima 1,000 permohonan sehari dan meminta sokongan daripada Kementerian Luar dan pejabat imigresen di Jakarta," katanya. - AGENSI.

Indonesian Ambassador to Malaysia Herman Prayitno has warned Indonesians not to seek work in Malaysia without proper documents.

Expatriates in Malaysia are required to have complete documents, including passports, working contracts, working visas and other documents, Herman said.

"Indonesians wanting to work in Malaysia must follow the official procedure," he said in Kuala Lumpur as quoted by Antara news agency on Wednesday.

Herman's warning came after the Malaysian police launched a nationwide raid against illegal immigrants, mostly workers.

Around 1,900 illegal immigrants including 695 Indonesians were arrested in the first day of raids after the Malaysian government closed registration for foreign workers on Tuesday.

Herman told Indonesian job seekers not to be cheated by illegal recruitment agencies promising jobs in Malaysia.

He said the embassy would continue to monitor the condition of the illegal Indonesian immigrants arrested by the Malaysian authorities.

Any deportation of the Indonesians should be handled properly and safely, he said.

Those arrested as illegal immigrants should seek documents like passports to enable them to return home to Indonesia.

An official of the Indonesian Embassy in Kuala Lumpur, Dino Nurwahyudin, said the embassy was ready to face a surge in applications for passports from those wanting to return to Indonesia.

"We are ready to serve 1,000 applicants per day. In the event of a surge in the number of applications we would ask for support from the Foreign Ministry and the immigration office in Jakarta," Dino said.

44 children among 1,757 illegal immigrants detained during raids

KUALA LUMPUR: Forty-four children were among the 1,757 illegal immigrants detained on the second day of the Immigration Department's nationwide integrated 6P operation to flush out unregistered foreign workers.

Immigration Department headquarters Enforcement Division deputy director Saravana Kumar Marimuthu said the operation also netted three employers for harbouring illegal immigrant workers.

The nationalities recorded were 739 Indonesians, Bangladeshis (275), Myanmarese (206), Indians (135) and the rest from other countries, he said.

"We checked 6,866 foreign workers, detained 1,757 illegal workers and three employers.

"They were caught for various offences under the Immigration Act, Immigration Rules 1963 and Anti-Trafficking In Persons and Anti-Smuggling of Migrants Act 2010 such as not having valid documents, over staying their visas and possessing forged passes or permits.

The 6P operation was started on Tuesday after the government had given illegal immigrants and their employers ample time to register under the special programme on the management of illegal immigrants which ended on Jan 20. — Bernama
